Introduction

Odisha has enormous natural resources and the potential for higher economic growth. Once considered backward in development, Odisha had been in the national headlines for its poor performance in various development indicators before 2004–05 (Rajan et al., 2013). According to the Planning Commission (2011), the state ranked second, after Bihar, in the percentage of poor people. Samantaraya et al. (2014) analysed both income and non-income indicators (literacy rate, infant mortality rate and maternal mortality rate) to show the improved economic position of Odisha. Post 2004 – 2005 has seen a faster decline in poverty in the state compared to the previous period (Sahoo, 2019), one of the highest among the Indian states (Planning Commission, 2014). However, Mishra (2012) opined that certain sections of people, such as the Scheduled Castes (SCs), Scheduled Tribes (STs), agricultural, and casual labour-continue to be especially vulnerable in Odisha. This implies a need to question inclusivity in growth and development.

Moreover, Odisha experiences vast migration. Mainly, seasonal migration is a cause of concern in the non-irrigated regions. Thus, lack of seasonal employment, decay of village industry, and lack of rural livelihood has been the centre of policy debate. In addition, urbanisation, community development and poverty alleviation are some contemporary issues before Odisha.

Odisha is also known for its flora and fauna. The state govt. generates a sizable share of the revenue from mining and tourism. Thus, sustainable development has also become an important policy issue. The impact of mining on the indigenous community of the state has remained a debate over the years. Livelihood creation for the tribes, reduction of dependency on the forest, financial inclusion of the backward communities are policy priorities for the Odisha government.

In this way, understanding the challenges and prospects of Odisha economy is crucial for policymakers, researchers, and students. The book aims to present the main trends related to research on Odisha economy, success stories with challenges in different sectors, and their implications for growth and development of society. This book intends to present a compilation of the state of the art and identify the new trends and theoretical and empirical studies on the challenges Odisha facing. The book will be organized by chapters from different authors. We hope to answer crucial questions on Odisha economy and issues related to its development. To this end, we intend to collect various contributions in the form of competing and complementary chapters on Odisha economy.

Required Word Counts

Please ensure that your manuscript follows the word count requirements specific to the publication format. The length of the paper should be limited to a maximum of 5,000 words including tables, figures and references.

Books

All manuscripts must

- be in scope of the book
- be submitted in Microsoft® Word
- be typewritten in English

Manuscript Checklist

- 1. Originality of manuscripts. Only ORIGINAL submissions will be accepted for publication. Manuscripts may not have been previously published or be submitted for publication elsewhere. In order to be considered original, a manuscript must be at least 90% new material with no more than 200 consecutive words (properly cited) repeated verbatim from any previously published work.
- 2. **Copyright.** Please note that the authors will be asked to sign the Author's Warranty and Transfer of Copyright Agreement.
- 3. **Peer review.** All submissions must undergo a blind review process before being accepted for publication. Authors of book chapters will be expected to serve as reviewers for 2-3 chapters. Authors have a vested interest in ensuring the quality of all chapters within the publication, as improving the quality of the publication as a whole will also improve the reception of their own work within it.
- 4. **General formatting.** Please format your chapter following APA 7th edition guidelines.
- 5. **Titles.** Titles may be no longer than 100 characters. Subtitles, if included, may be no longer than 50 characters.

- Note that all titles must be entered in title case. To put a title in title case, the first letter of each word should be capitalized unless that word is a preposition (position words such as "by," "to," or "at"), conjunction (connecting words such as "and" or "but"), or article ("a," "an," or "the") fewer than four letters long. The only exceptions to this rule are that the first and last words of the title or subtitle are always capitalized, even if they are articles, prepositions, or conjunctions.
- o Titles may not be written in all capital letters (e.g., "CHAPTER TITLE" is incorrect; "Chapter Title" is correct)
- 6. **Abstract (Executive Summary for Casebooks).** Every chapter should include an abstract of 100-150 words that provides the reader with an overview of the chapter. Please write abstracts in third person.
- 7. **Headings.** Please format all headings to match APA 7th edition guidelines.

 - Figure Callouts. All images included in the chapter manuscript must be called out
 in the body of the chapter to guide the readers to look at the figures to better
 present the research.
- 9. **Tables.** All tables included in any submitted research manuscript can remain in the document.
 - Table Captions. All tables included in the chapter manuscript are to be accompanied by captions. These captions should briefly explain the study, results, etc. Tables should also be numbered sequentially throughout the manuscript.
 - Table Callouts. All tables included in the chapter manuscript must be referenced in the body of the chapter.
- Equations. If a symbol or equation can by typed directly into Microsoft Word, please do so.
- 11. **APA citations.** Please ensure that all information in your manuscript that is taken from another source is substantiated with an in-text reference citation. The publisher will return your submission to you for correction if you do not properly format your references.

- Self citation. Researchers may need to cite their previously published works in order to communicate an idea effectively in their present manuscript.
- 12. Additional Reading (book chapters only). If relevant, please provide a list of no more than 10 related references in APA style.
- 13. **Key Terms and Definitions**. All book chapters must include a list of 4+ key terms and definitions following the references and additional reading lists. Definitions must be written in the chapter author's own words. Please include these at the end of the paper.
